

Next month's theme will be Sarracenia leucophylla and its hybrids.



The meeting opened at 19:55.

MINUTES OF PREVIOUS MEETING

The minutes of the previous meeting of 10th February 2023 were tabled at this meeting. But will be at the following meeting so they may be accepted as a true record of that event.

BUSINESS ARISING / GENERAL BUSINESS

- 1) Great news! The March edition of Carniflora Australis is almost complete. Links and printed journals will be sent out soon.
- 2) The proposed updated constitution for the society, which included splitting the role of the membership secretary and changing how the society can undertake financial transactions, was included in the February Newsletter. The new constitution was voted upon by members and passed unanimously with no opposing votes.
- The Royal Easter Show will have a carnivorous plant competition on April 6th and 7th with 8 categories. Entries closed on March 1st and participants were allowed to enter as many plants as they wanted. More information is available in the March newsletter. Marlon Maclean will give a talk at the RES.
- 4) The Collectors' Plant Fair at Clarendon is scheduled for April 15th and 16th. The Society has been informed that their stall area will be smaller this year, so they will pre-allocate space to members selling plants. This will be discussed at the April meeting. The Society's items, such as the cash box, are currently with Füzzy and will be brought to the April meeting for others to hold.
- The Southern Highlands Botanical Garden Autumn Plant Fair is taking place on April 22nd and 23rd and the society has been invited to participate. The event may be too far for Sydney-based members but it may interest members in the Canberra chapter. Details of the event have been forwarded to Robert Little by Füzzy.

- The Wollondilly Shire Council is organising a plant fair and garden expo on October 30th at Picton Botanic Gardens, Regreme Road, Picton NSW. Fuzzy has shared the event details in the society's Gmail account under 'Events' folder. The society is considering attending next year since many more *Sarracenia* plants will be in good condition by that time. Various nods indicated that no one opposed the idea.
- 7) The Carnivorous Plant Society in London has invited members of the Australian Carnivorous Plant Society to participate in a questionnaire to develop growing tips for carnivorous plants. The questionnaire is being organised by Ms. Mollie Brown, and her contact email is mollie@horticulture.co.uk. - 8) Thanks to Jeff Williams who has generously offered to give a talk about carnivorous plants to the Willoughby Garden Club and other interested individuals.
- 9) Jeffrey Williams has requested a power point presentation from the Society to give talks at various plant Societies. Kirk has made the presentation available through Google Docs.
- 10) The Annual Show has been rescheduled from Friday afternoon to Saturday, December 9th.
- 11) Wesley needs to follow up with Robert Little regarding electronic funds transfer options now that the new constitution has been passed.

He s will viab	David provided instructions on how to pollinate and cross <i>Pinguicula</i> plants to increase their diversity. He suggests using a toothpick and labelling crosses with bread-tags, and notes that not all crosses will be successful. The seed should be sown on a perlite and vermiculite mix and kept wet, but viability may vary and seed may not remain viable for long. Results may take up to a week to appear and the seed should be ripe in about 30 days.							
med	Dave also described a method for creating a vertical garden using sphagnum moss as a growing medium and run drippers to water the plants. This method requires similar conditions to those needed for <i>Nepenthes</i> .

Gro	Water by misting spray. Grow in a mix of perlite and vermiculite OR in thin peaty sand spread in cracks in a limestone rock. Limestone rocks can be bought from aquarium shops, chose the rocks with lots of holes and a flat bottom. Place limestone rocks in a shallow saucer of water.

IN THE GREENHOUSE

ALDROVANDA

Plants are in active growth. Consider adding fresh decomposing leaf litter to the water to add CO2. Keep frogs and tadpoles out of the water, as they may eat the plants. Plants will divide rapidly. Plants may be grown in shade to reduce algae growth.

BROCCHINIA / CATOPSIS

Maintain high light levels and humidity. Water from above. Feed with 1/4 strength urea free liquid fertiliser every 4 weeks or so.

BYBLIS

Byblis gigantea and B. lamellata are naturally dormant over summer but may be kept in growth with constant soil moisture. Keep the soil moist to wet. Flowering continues. Harvest seed.

The northern annual species of *Byblis* will now be in active growth. Growth rates will be higher in hot and humid conditions. Cross pollinate the flowers to ensure seed set.

Growth rates for all species of *Byblis* may be accelerated with increased prey capture or fertilisation. Place some rotting fruit around the plants or sprinkle granulated fish food onto the leaves. Pollinate the flowers using the "buzz" technique.

CEPHALOTUS

Keep the soil moist but well drained. Avoid fungal problems by keeping good air movement around the plants.

DARLINGTONIA

Darlingtonia will be in active growth. Stolons will begin growing under the substrate. Watch out for hot days. Place your plants in more shade or consider bringing them indoors during hot weather. Night temperatures are high so it is imperative that the roots are kept cool.

DIONAEA

All VFTs should be in active growth. Many varieties will begin to produce upright petioles and traps, a strategy to compete with surrounding vegetation. Keep well watered.

DROSERA

Tuberous *Drosera* are dormant and will soon break dormancy. Ensure your repotting is done this month. Keep the pots barely moist.

Pygmy *Drosera* are dormant over summer and survive with the production of white stipule buds to reflect the sun and absorb the morning dew. Plants may be kept moister to keep in active growth.

Other Winter growing species such as *D. cistiflora* and *D. pauciflora* are still dormant. Reduce watering and keep the pots barely moist.

Tropical and subtropical species will be in full growth and flower. Keep the soil very moist. Collect seed and sow onto a peat based media.

Temperate *Drosera* such as *D. filiformis*, *D. intermedia* and *D. rotundifolia* will be in active growth and flower. Seed pods will be maturing, harvest seed.

DROSOPHYLLUM

Drosophyllum will be in active growth. Flowering commences in spring and continues into summer. Flowers are self fertile. Harvest seed. Avoid hot and humid conditions. Growth rates increase with increased prey capture.

GENLISEA

Genlisea should be in flower and active growth. Keep the water levels high with these species.

HELIAMPHORA

Keep plants in a bright and very humid location. Avoid temperatures over 30°C. Fertilise with a diluted foliar application of urea free fertiliser every 2-4 weeks.

NEPENTHES

Some *Nepenthes* struggle over the Australian summer. Aim to keep the lowland plants warm to hot and in high humidity. Highland species require cooler nights. Mist in the afternoon to reduce air temperatures and increase humidity.

PINGUICULA

Mexican species/hybrids are in active growth. Keep the soil moist and humidity high.

Warm temperate species such as *P. primuliflora* and *P. lusitanica* will continue growth. Keep the water up to *P. primuliflora* and take leaf cuttings.

RORIDULA

Roridula is in active growth. Flowering ends. Harvest any seed. Keep the soil moist and place in a very bright and airy situation with low humidity.

SARRACENIA

All *Sarracenia* species/hybrids are in active growth. Keep well watered and in full sun. *S. flava* and *S. oreophila* will produce non-carnivorous phyllodia. *S. leucophylla* and *S. rubra* will produce larger and more upright pitchers. They look their best in autumn.

UTRICULARIA

Most terrestrial *Utricularia* will be in active growth and flower. Keep moist to wet.

Aquatic *Utricularia* are in active growth. Keep algae under control.

Winter growing species, such as *U. multifida* and *U. menziesii* are still dormant. Keep the soil barely moist.

Tropical *Utricularia* - Maintain higher temperatures, humidity and air movement. Keep soils moist.


SEED BANK


FIELD GUIDE TO THE CARNIVOROUS PLANTS OF SYDNEY AND THE BLUE MOUNTAINS
