# **MEETINGS**



We hope you can attend one of our meetings and enjoy the fellowship of other enthusiasts for these wonderful plants.


### SYDNEY



# HELD ON FRIDAY, 1st JULY, 2023

# DOWNER COMMUNITY CENTRE

The Canberra meeting of the AUSCPS opened at 07:30 p.m. AEST with John Nielsen chairing.

An administration discussion was held to identify a new convener for the meeting, as Robert Little had indicated a desire to step down from the role. John Nielsen and Cassie Rogers both indicated interest in acting as convenor, with members supporting the joint appointment unanimously. Cassie agreed to host the next meeting (August 2023), with John to host the September 2023 meeting.

Damian Porombka then provided a brief talk on his visit to the International Carnivorous Plant Society (ICPS) conference in Himeji, Japan. Damian gave a summary of the talks was given, noting many were very technical in nature, with relatively few aimed at hobby growers. He noted that the meeting field trips were a major highlight, especially the *Nepenthes* and *Sarracenia* collections at the Hyogo Flower Centre curated by master Japanese grower Hirofumi Doi. Damian also provided members with carnivorous plant stickers obtained at the conference from Mathias Maier (Matze), who operates the famed Green Jaws nursery in Germany.

John then gave a presentation introducing members and guests to concepts of Taxonomy and Nomenclature. Both concepts were introduced as biological standards that provide a classification structure akin to a filing system for life (taxonomy), with nomenclature setting the standard for scientific names. Latin American *Morpho* butterflies from John's insect collection were used to introduce taxonomy and nomenclature because rules for zoological (animal) nomenclature are less complex than Botanical Nomenclature. *Sarracenia* were then used as subjects for explaining the core differences between each system. Emphasis was placed on how scientific names are formatted, and how museum specimens known as Type Specimens establish a link between names and living organisms, and how different author interpretations of names are reflected in botanical nomenclature. Members appreciated the talk and John's natural enthusiasm for the subject, which allowed him to cover the complex subject matter in a very relatable manner.

John has offered to give his presentation to the Sydney members if there is sufficient interest expressed.

The winner was: *Drosera alba* grown by Kirk. It grows beside vernal pools on a sandstone mesa on the edge of desert in SW Africa. The site is baked over summer. In cultivation expose the pots to heat, and keep away from rain. Use a mix of fine sand with horticultural clay and some peat. Encourage moss to grow on the surface of the mix. Keep sitting in water in winter. Grow in shallow trays.

Other plants:

- 42. D. scorpioides
- 43. D. binata multifida

Repot tuberous sundews in summer, when dormant. Repot South-African sundews in winter, when in growth.

Use a colour-contrasting growing mix to enable the tubers to be found more easily.

Place pots in a tray of water when growth emerges above the surface of the mix.

# TALK ON TUBEROUS DROSERA PROPAGATION – Dave Colbourn

Complete in July, Dave used *Drosera squamosa* to show the technique. Undertake when the prime tuber is still large and not depleted, but the new growth is quite vigorous. Separate the stolon and new growth from the mother tuber – cut with 1 cm of stolon attached to the parent tuber. Plant the tuber once again and plant the rosette directly back into soil, with the long stolon underground. The tuber will form new tubers, although these will be of small size. The detached plant will form a new tuber.

Plant rosettes back in original pot. Pot tubers in a separate pot, pointy end up.

Trials with different rosetted sundews. *Drosera stolonifera* complex – limited success. *Drosera peltata* complex – why bother when it grows so readily from seed?

Seed – smoke exposure is not necessary, nor is gibberellic acid. They're naturally treated by heat over the summer. Place seed on soil surface in November. Expose to heat and light. Water in autumn. Can take 5 years to reach maturity, although *D. peltata* complex plants can mature within 2 years.



# **IN THE GREENHOUSE**

### ALDROVANDA

Plants will now be dormant if grown outside. *Aldrovanda* survive the Winter chills by producing a turion, which either floats on the water surface or sinks to the bottom of the pond. Keep an eye on them so they do not get washed away or eaten by birds and animals.

### **BROCCHINIA / CATOPSIS**

Maintain high light levels and humidity. Apply light foliar fertilisation (Avoid fertilisers high in Urea). Potted plants will produce more pups which may be divided when semi-mature.

### BYBLIS

Byblis gigantea and B. lamellata are now in active growth. Keep the soil moist to wet. Treat seed with Ga3 or smoke water. Germination in Autumn usually takes 2-3 weeks.

The northern annual species of Byblis will soon finish their life cycle. Harvest seed.

### CEPHALOTUS

Keep the soil moist but well drained. Avoid fungal problems by keeping good air movement around the plants. Non-carnivorous leaves should be in full production. Pitchers will colour up nicely with the cooler nights.

#### DARLINGTONIA

*Darlingtonia* is now dormant. Keep moist and cold as long as possible to ensure a full dormancy is achieved. Sow seed onto moist Sphagnum moss and expose to the cold nights to aid stratification of the seed.

#### DIONAEA

All VFTs will now be dormant. Sow seed onto your preferred medium and expose to the cold to aid stratification of the seed. Seed will germinate in Spring.

### DROSERA

Tuberous *Drosera* are now in active growth. Keep the pots moist. Add small wire trainers for the stem forming species.

Pygmy *Drosera* will end their gemmae phase and begin to produce carnivorous leaves. Keep plants moist to wet in full sun.

Other Winter growing species such as *Drosera ramentacea*, *D.cistiflora* and *D. pauciflora* will be in full growth and flower. Keep the pots moist to wet.

Tropical and sub-tropical species need to be kept warm to keep them alive. Species such as *D. burmannii* will begin to die. Harvest the seed and sow in Spring.

Petiolaris-complex species may need artificial heating to keep them alive. Aim for a minimum temperature of 25°C. Keep the pots moist to stop the plants entering dormancy.

Temperate Drosera such as D. filiformis, D. intermedia and D. rotundifolia may resume growth from their Winter dormancy. Increase sunlight and water.

### DROSOPHYLLUM

*Drosophyllum* is in active growth and may be kept wetter during to cooler month. Seed may be sown onto moist compost after treatment with boiling water for 10 seconds. Germination may be from 2-8 weeks. Feed with insects to boost growth.

### GENLISEA

*Genlisea* should be in flower and active growth. Keep the water levels high with these species. Leaf and trap production will improve when the water level is at soil level. Artificial heating may be required. Avoid exposure to frosts and ideally keep plants above 10°C.

### **HELIAMPHORA**

Keep plants in a bright but cool location. Mist regularly to help keep the pots cool. Light levels may be increased with the cooler nights.

#### NEPENTHES

Winter sees a dramatic drop in the growth rates and pitcher production of *Nepenthes*. Keep the lowland species above 15°C at night and as warm as possible during the day. Highland species enjoy cooler nights and will continue to grow. Keep highland plants above 5°C at night and between 20-25°C during the day.

#### PINGUICULA

Mexican species/hybrids are entering dormancy and often flower during this stage. Pollinate the flowers to obtain seed. Most species produce smaller fleshier leaves (heterophyllous). Some species such as *P. gigantea* will produce smaller typical leaves (homophyllous). Keep humidity high but the soil drier. Leaf cuttings may be taken by pulling the older leaves from the mother plant. Ensure you get all of the leaf including the white parts close to the roots.

Warm-temperate and temperate species such as *P. primuliflora* and *P. lusitanica* will continue to grow. Keep the water up to *P. primuliflora* and take leaf cuttings.

### RORIDULA

*Roridula* growth rates increase with the cooler nights. Seed may be harvested now. Sow onto moist peat/sand. Germination may take 3-8 weeks. Keep the soil moist and ensure good air circulation.

#### SARRACENIA

*Sarracenia* may be beginning to exit dormancy by sending up flower buds in temperate and cooler climates. Ensure you remove all of the dead, and dying, pitchers and phyllodes. Increase plants exposure to the sun and watch for caterpillar, scale and mealy bug attack. Germination of seed will occur in warmer weather.

#### UTRICULARIA

Most terrestrial *Utricularia* will be in active growth and flower. Keep moist to wet. Flowering will resume in Spring.

Aquatic *Utricularia* will slow in growth and may be dormant. Keep an eye out for *U. australis* turions floating on the water's surface.

Winter growing species, such as U. multifida and U. menziesii will be in active growth.

Tropical Utricularia - Maintain higher temperatures, humidity and air movement. Keep soils moist.

### **POTTING MIXES**




### THE SAVAGE GARDEN
